IN THE **BEGINNING** ...

Many believe the formal University Chaplaincy began with the construction of the chapel building. In fact, it was first mooted by the Board of Governors in 1928 and the first Chaplain, then termed the 'University Pastor', was the Rev'd Dr. **Charles Wellington** Rose. He began as Chaplain in 1930.

Because of the Great Depression, finances became difficult for the University so the chaplaincy was concluded in 1933. In 1953, the Rev'd Charles Taylor, recently graduated, and a new professor, took over some of the duties (but not the title) of being a chaplain. This continued until 1962 when the Rev'd Frank Locke began the present series of chaplains.

The chapel is a member of the Wolfville Area Inter-Church Council, which is a fellowship of the churches in Wolfville and Port Williams. The Council committee meets every second Wednesday at the chapel library. The council has many activities including the Food Bank (based at the Baptist Church), helping agencies through the food bank, conducts ecumenical services at appropriate times such as the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and Good Friday, and has financed over one million dollars' worth of Hearth Homes in the county.




This term we will think about 'spirit' and our interaction with the Holy Spirit. Often neglected these days, it is at the core of understanding our relationship with the Divine.
