Dear Acadia Students,

Resilience Through Ritual, Remembered Stories and the Strains of Music

This week marks the end of formal instructions for Acadia University courses and the beginning of the weeks for the completion of final assessments. This is also the time of the COVID-19 pandemic. Significantly, this week is the time when Jews and Christians have some of their most important observances. These observances include rituals, remembered stories and the strains of special music that promote resilience and faith in God.

Christians observe Sunday, April 5, 2020 as Palm Sunday. Palm Sunday rituals include decorating churches with palm branches and remembering the story of Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey. The rituals and story found in the Bible symbolize victory and the coming of a King who saves. Holy Week is observed from Palm Sunday until the Saturday of the week. Rituals between Thursday and Saturday reflect on Jesus' suffering, betrayal, abandonment by friends, unjust condemnation and painful execution. Easter Sunday follows when the rituals celebrate Jesus resurrection, the overcoming of death and new life.

The Jewish Passover recalls the story, recorded in the Torah, of God raising up a great leader, Moses, who delivered God's people from enslavement, sickness, death, danger and despair. The Passover includes special rituals such as the Seder meal. The Passover observance this week begins at sunset on Wednesday April 8 and ends at sunset seven or eight days later. In both Jewish and Christian observances this year, special music will play a part.

In addition to formal religious observances some families have established traditions to inspire and motivate each other. Informal rituals and stories of resilience are sometimes passed on in families. Are there stories of members of your family overcoming adversity and special family celebrations that have been passed on from one generation to another? Are there special songs or instrumental music that make you feel optimistic and courageous? Can you recall them now?

You are invited to explore religious resources of ritual and sacred stories to help you cope as you complete the last of your assessments and plan for the future. Some resources for Holy Week and Easter are on the Manning Memorial Chapel website. They include music, Bible readings, plus reflection and prayer guides. You are also encouraged to explore other relevant spiritual resources; recall inspiring stories from your own family or about persons whom you admire; and listen to inspiring music to build your resilience at this time.

INTRODUCTION

Holy Week is observed from Palm Sunday to Holy Saturday and followed by Easter Sunday. This marks a period that is central to the main beliefs and practices within Christianity. You are invited to join in this observation with Christians across the Western world. Short meditations are offered below for the five main days in the eight-day period. OVERVIEW

The days in Holy Week and Easter Sunday focus on key events in the life of Jesus the Christ. A drama is recorded in the Bible, rehearsed each year and reflected on by Christian churches and groups across the world. The main 'acts' of the drama are observed as: Palm Sunday - the triumphal entry; Maundy Thursday – the institution of the Eucharist/Holy Communion; Good Friday – the

death of Jesus by crucifixion; Holy Saturday – Jesus remains buried in a tomb; Easter Sunday - Jesus is raised from death.

An invitation is being given for us to reflect on what these stories might mean for us at this time as we cope with the COVID- 19 pandemic, search for a 'new normal' and find hope for the future.

READING	Matthew 21:1-11
	<u>Summary</u> : Jesus instructs his disciples to fetch a donkey and her colt. He rides the donkey into Jerusalem and crowds gather putting tree branches in their way. They hail Jesus as the king that had been spoken about by a prophet -a king who would come to help the people.
	<u>Notes:</u> The donkey and the branches placed for Jesus to ride on symbolize a King or general who is humble and who brings peace, grace and victory. But there are also those who question this understanding of Jesus.

READING

John 13:1-17, 31b-35

<u>Summary</u>: Jesus and his followers (disciples) gather to celebrate the Passover. This is a Jewish festival celebrating God's freeing of God's people from enslavement. Jesus washes the feet of his disciples. Jesus tells his disciples that an example has been set as the teacher has washed the feet of his disciples. Jesus' followers are also to wash each other's feet and love each other.

<u>Notes</u>: In the context of the story, when guests visited a home a slave would wash the dusty feet of the guests. Jesus, the esteemed

Teacher, served his followers by providing the service that would normally be done by the person with the lowest rank in the society. On March 24, 2016, Pope Francis washed and kissed the feet of refugees from different religions. At this time during the COVID- 19 pandemic, many refugees and homeless people are without proper shelter and many are walking...

John 18:1-19:42

<u>Summary</u>: Jesus is identified by his disciple Judas and arrested. Jesus is then questioned by the High Priest and while that is happening, his disciple Peter denies knowing Jesus. Jesus then appears before Pilate as the people demand that Jesus be executed by crucifixion. Jesus is crucified as three women including his mother plus a male disciple are standing at the foot of the cross. Jesus speaks from the cross and dies. Two other friends get permission from Pilate to take Jesus' body and they put the body in a tomb.

<u>Notes</u>: One way of portraying important stories in the Bible has been through sacred art, including stained glass windows. In the past, these were often developed to help illiterate church members learn about the Bible stories. Stained glass windows and other religious art can also be understood as a means of interpreting Bible stories and presenting the Artist's interpretation for the reflection of the viewers.



Matthew 27:57-66

<u>Summary</u>: Jesus' friends take his body and place it in a tomb. Some women sit opposite the tomb. The next day the chief priests and Pharisees ask and Pilate agrees to send soldiers to secure and seal the tomb. They wanted to prevent the disciples stealing the body and saying that Jesus had been raised from the dead.



<u>Notes</u>: The COVID-19 crisis has caused a stillness and a 'burial' of many of the activities that would normally be happening at this time. Social distancing requires us to stay home, in our 'caves.' Pause to consider the possibility that being buried and unable to get out may be an opportunity. What could be the result of silence, of lack of activity, of being in the dark? A seed buried in the ground can die, germinate and new life grows....

Matthew 28:1-10

<u>Summary</u>: Mary Magdalene and another woman, also named Mary go to Jesus' tomb. There is an earthquake and an angel appears, telling them not to be afraid as Jesus had been raised from the dead. The angel tells them to look and see that Jesus is not in the tomb and to go tell the disciples that Jesus would meet them in Galilee. They hurry to give the message feeling both fearful and joyful. On the way they see Jesus who greets them and tells them not to be afraid, and to go tell the disciples that Jesus will meet them in Galilee.

In the past, these were often developed to help illiterate church members learn about the Bible stories. 


